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Symbols in the Church - Mrs. Blair's Class on Symbols

Symbols on the Altar

Front of the Altar, middle row, from left-right



CHRISTMAS ROSE (Messiah's promise, Christ is still alive)

You will see this on the front and back of the altar. The rose refers to the prophecy of Isaiah, where it is stated that the desert shall blossom as the rose at the coming of the Kingdom of Righteousness. The rose is said to date back only to the thirteenth century.

The Christmas rose symbolizes the Nativity of our Lord. The rose was first called the white rose when people began to notice that it would stand the ravages of the winter; later it was named the Christmas rose when they noticed that it bloomed just at Christmas time.

"Despite wars which shook the whole earth, there still exists a might power which can shape a rose or lead shepherds to a king."



THE PELICAN-IN-HER-PIETY (Atonement)

This is one of the most widely used, and most striking symbols of our Lord's atonement. A pelican shown plucking open her breast, feeding her young with her own blood. Several explanations are given. In times of famine, the female pelican is supposed to tear open her breast and feed her young with her own life blood. She dies in order that they may live. In like manner our

Blessed Lord died upon the cross that we might live. Another variation of this legend of the pelican is that the serpent is the enemy of the pelican and that his sting brings death to the young. The mother mourns over her dead brood, and then vulns herself, and her warm blood flowing upon them restores their lives.

The symbol is a touching one, reminding us that our Lord Jesus Christ has redeemed us, delivering us from all sins, from death and from the power of the devil, not with gold or <u>silver</u>, but with His holy precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death.

THE UNICORN (symbol of a sinless life)

The unicorn is a familiar symbol of our Lord Jesus Christ. This fabled animal is pictured as a graceful creature with a horse's head, a goat's beard, an antelope's legs and a lion's tail. From the center of his forehead rises a great spiral horn. It is a symbol of our Lord's incarnation and His sinless life. The unicorn of olden times was said to evade asked efforts to capture it, and the

only possible manner of overtaking it was to place an undefiled virgin in the forest. (Continues on inside cover)

The unicorn was said to run to her and lay his head in her lap. This was regarded as a symbol of our Lord, whom the heavens could not contain, but who humbled himself and was born of a virgin, and was made man. Ancient writers, both pagan and Christian, had a great faith in the unicorn, and several of them give minute descriptions of this animal.



THE FLEUR-DE-LIS

The fleur-de-lis with its three divisions ids a widely used symbol of the Trinity, despite the fact that it is also symbolic of the Virgin Mary.

THE FLEUR-DE-LYS

This is another symbol of the Annunciation of Our Lord, likewise of His human nature, and of the Virgin Mother. (this is also found on the back of the Altar)

We will track our progress by placing backpacks on the paper doll children on the display in the narthex. Each backpack represents five children who can go to school, thanks to you!

Items may be placed in the schoolhouse in the narthex from now through August 18.

The women (with a few men helping) have sewn more than 575 backpacks and the Bible School children have strung the cord through the casing. One step

remains to complete the sacks before we fill them – to thread the cord through the loops and tie square knots to secure the two ends together. Remember these tips for staying safe in extreme heat:

Hydrate. Whether you feel thirsty or not, drink plenty of water to avoid becoming dehydrated, *especially* when you're working or exercising outside.



Educate yourself. Keep up with the latest temperature and heat index forecasts and current readings (take actions to stay cool and safe when the temperatures hit 85 degrees or the heat index hits 90 degrees). Know the warning signs of a heat illness, and how to stay cool.

Act quickly when a heat illness is suspected. Seek medical attention immediately for any of these warning signs: cramping, rapid pulse, heavy sweating, hot red skin, dizziness, confusion, nausea, vomiting.

Take it easy. Anyone working or exercising outdoors should avoid overexertion, especially between the hours of 11 am and 6 pm. Take hourly breaks in the shade or in the air conditioning.
