Front of the Altar, bottom row, from left-right



CHRISTMAS ROSE

This is a Nativity symbol. The poinsettia is believed by some to have the same meaning,



GLASTONBURY THORN (The Nativity)

The ancient thorn-tree, which stands just within the gates of the great ruined Abbey at Glastonbury, Somersetshire, England, is believed by many to be a descendant of the Thornwood staff planted by St. Joseph of Arimathaea, who is said to have introduced Christianity into England in the year 63 A.D. The Glastonbury thorn has the remarkable habit of bursting

into bloom about Christmas day each year, as any of the citizens of the town will attest. Because of this fact, the blossoms of the Glastonbury Thorn are symbols of our Lord's Nativity. Recent archaeological investigations carried on at the Glastonbury seem to verify the tradition of the extreme antiquity of British Christianity, and to make it possible that the thorn tree was planted by early missionaries. The original tree, which was of great age, was destroyed by a puritan fanatic.



THE GLADIOLUS (The Word Made Flesh)

The Gladiolus is a symbol of the Incarnation: The Word made Flesh



THE FISH

The fish is another very early symbol. A rebus (a mode of expressing words and phrases by signs) I X O Y C meaning "fish". Each letter was regarded as the initial of a word in the sentence. This is translated as Jesus Christ Son's God Savior. Used at first in the first century, its meaning may not have been

known to pagan persecutors, yet to the early Christians it was an emblem of profound significance, and at all times it was a sermon in stone, expressing the fact of man's need of a savior, and the fact of salvation only through Jesus Christ.

In the days when it was dangerous to be a Christian, the followers of Jesus resorted to secret signs and symbols to keep from exposing themselves unnecessarily to the foes of Christianity. For example, a man sometimes drew the picture of a fish in the sand while talking with another. If the figure was recognized to signify more than an unconscious movement during the course of a conversation, the two would identify each other in the Christian faith.

During the days when Christians had to worship in secret, visiting Christians could find their way to the worship center in the long underground passageways by simply looking at the fish on the wall pointing in the direction in which way they were to go.

The strange symbol of the fish has an intricate background. The Greek word for fish (pronounced ichthus) is formed by using the first letter of each of the words in Greek IXOYC which spells out "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior". It is precisely because the symbol was difficult to understand that it was precious. It was a protection from non-Christians.

While the single fish represents the Savior, several fish represents faithful Christians. In Matthew 4:19 the beginnings of the development of the symbol can be seen: "And he said to them, 'follow me, and I will make you fishers of men'."

The fish as a symbol does not appear often today, but whenever we see it, we think of the heroic time when Christians underwent persecutions and trials for their faith and succeeded in spreading the gospel despite many obstacles.
