Symbols in the Church - Mrs. Blair's Class on Symbols



- 1. FLUER-DE-LIS
- 2. PELICAN-IN-HER PIETY (Atonement)
- 3. **PHEONIX** (newness of life)
- 4. GLADIOLUS (Word made flesh)
- 5. THE OX

This is based upon our Lord's words in St. Matthew 11:30 "For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." The ox is the symbol of strength, of patience, and of sacrifice. Ready either for the plough or for the altar. For this reason, the ox is symbol for our Redeemer.

6. THE ANCHOR

An anchor is a symbol of a hope "sure and steadfast".

A story is told of a rural church in Maine where there is a painting of an anchor on the wall in back of the pulpit. Most of the people who worship in this church are connected with the trade of fishing and know the dangers of the sea fro, experience. The anchor is especially fitting to these folk because it speaks of hope and salvation in the midst of howling winds on a perilous sea. Our Lord, who saved Peter from drowning and who answers the prayers of the modern man as well, is the source of their s and our hope.

Youth - **Horsefeathers** - Fourteen-year-old Sarah "Scoop" Coop know horses better than she knows herself--especially Orphan, a mixed breed mare from her grandfather's stable. Scoop is kind of an orphan herself. She never knew her birth parents. She was raised by adoptive parents who died in a tragic accident. Now she and her brother live

with Aunt Dotty. Grandfather Coop lives nearby and runs a horse stable, but Aunt Dotty is the one who helps Scoop understand life and learn about God. When Grandad becomes unexpectedly ill, the stable becomes imperiled. Will Scoop lose Orphan? Will the business fold? How can Scoop keep the things she loves best? God offers some surprising answers. 2024 SYNOD ASSEMBLY REPORT

The 37th Annual Assembly of the Upper Susquehanna Synod was held at Susquehanna University, June 14 -15, 2024. The theme of the Assembly was "Fed by Jesus to Feed the World." It was based on John 21: 15 -17.

The Assembly began Friday morning, June 14, with workshops and conversations. These workshops covered the current issues and work of the church, such as civic life and faith, youth ministry, the changing landscape of Christian Education, the lack of pastors, and ministry in divided times.

The Bible Study leader for the Assembly was Rev. Dr. Lisa Barnes. Rev. Barnes' topic was "Food, Faith, and the Sea." Rev. Barnes' presentation spoke to how people of faith follow God's teaching to care for all, and have used food to show care, build fellowship, and express their faith, from the beginning of time.

The Assembly conducted the business of the Synod.

The Assembly held elections for Synod Council, Consultation Committee, and the 2025 Church wide Assembly.

Chad Hershberger gave an update on improvements being made at Camp Mt. Luther.

Resolutions were adopted that changes the quorum for Synod Assembly from 50% to 40% of eligible voting members and to review the Synod constitution regarding quorum and voting membership.

The Rev. Chad Hebrink, Synod treasurer, presented his report for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31 2024. In his report, he noted Mission Support from congregations was 97.7% of the budgeted amount. Total expenses were 103.32% of the budgeted amount. However, due to higher than budgeted interest income and the onetime gain from the sale of the Synod office building in Lewisburg, revenues over expenses showed a surplus \$22,553.55.

The Assembly approved the proposed budget for the fiscal year ending January 31, 2026. This budget shows a projected deficit of \$1272.34, but due to adjustments and onetime expenses, the Finance Committee is comfortable with the relatively small projected deficit.

The Assembly also approved the 2025 salary and housing guidelines for pastors and deacons.

The Assembly recognized the 50th anniversary of ELCA World Hunger, representing it in the theme of this year's Assembly, "Fed by Jesus to Feed the World." Over these 50 years, the Synod has given \$94,350. The Assembly collected an in- gathering offering of \$2, 191.
