

Lion or Lamb?



Does March really come in like a lion and go out like a lamb? I would like to think so. This old folkloric saying gives me hope that warmer weather may just be on the way. I am not sure though, just how reliable this saying is. Its source is simply from farmer's observations over the centuries. But in any case, March often serves as a transition month between seasons.

The image of a lion and a lamb is used in Scripture to refer to Jesus Christ. He is the "Lion of Judah" spoken of in this same chapter (verse 5) as He was born in the line of Judah. *Revelation 5:12* honors Jesus as the Lamb of God. He is the sacrificial Lamb that is forever victorious!

It is much more comfortable to think of Jesus as a lamb than a strong ferocious lion. Yet He is both. His avenging justice and judgement reminds me of a lion. His gentle warm love reminds me of a lamb. Both are true. He would not be a God worth worshiping if He did not use His mighty power to right wrongs. As a lamb He is worthy as well of all our love and adoration for the ultimate sacrifice He made. The Lamb of God is undeniably as strong and victorious as a lion. The two images seem to come together in this heavenly scene. But because Jesus is my sacrificial Lamb, I can approach His holy, ferocious and fearsome presence with confidence.

Social Concerns in Our Community Homelessness is real ... and it's right here in our own backyard.

Homelessness in the Williamsport area is on the rise. Most people do not "choose" homelessness. The causes are many and varied. As of this printing, we have received word that the <u>Code Blue shelter is at maximum capacity</u> of 30 people per night.



U.S. Homelessness Up 18% in 2024

The United States saw an 18.1% increase in homelessness in 2024, a dramatic rise driven mostly by a lack of affordable housing according to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. That increase comes on top of a 12% increase in 2023, which HUD blamed on soaring rents and the end of pandemic assistance. The 2023 increase also was driven by people experiencing homelessness for the first time. The numbers overall represent 23 of every 10,000 people in the U.S., with Black people being overrepresented among the homeless population. Among the most concerning trends was a nearly 40% rise in family homelessness (Source: Associated Press)

Why Are U.S. Families Hungry?

Low-income households already spend a greater share of their income on food. Food accounts for 16.4 percent of spending for households making less than \$10,000 per year compared to the U.S. average of 12.7 percent. A person working full-time at the minimum wage earns about \$14,500 a year.

Approximately 13.5 percent of U.S. households — more than 47 million Americans, including nearly 14 million children — struggle to put food on the table. Here the measure of hunger is "food insecurity" — an ongoing uncertainty of where the next meal will come from. More than 1 in 5 U.S. children are at risk of hunger (1 in 3 among Black and Latino(a) children). To the surprise of many, most Americans (51.4 percent) will live in poverty at some point before age 65.
