### March 5, 2025 ASH WEDNESDAY



On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

#### WORD

#### FIRST READING Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

Because of the coming day of the LORD, the prophet Joel calls the people to a community lament. The repentant community declares that God is gracious and asks God to spare the people lest the nations doubt God's power to save.

**A**: A reading from Joel:

<sup>1</sup>Blow the trumpet in Zion;

sound the alarm on my holy mountain!

Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble,

for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near—

<sup>2</sup>a day of darkness and gloom,

a day of clouds and thick darkness!

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Messiah Lutheran Church Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old. nor will be again after them in ages to come. <sup>12</sup>Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; <sup>13</sup>rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. <sup>14</sup>Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD, your God? <sup>15</sup>Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly: <sup>16</sup>gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. <sup>17</sup>Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?' "

#### SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:20b--6:10

The ministry of the gospel endures many challenges and hardships. Through this ministry, God's reconciling activity in the death of Christ reaches into the depths of our lives to bring us into a right relationship with God. In this way, God accepts us into the reality of divine salvation.

**A**: A Reading from Second Corinthians:

<sup>20b</sup>We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup>For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

<sup>6:1</sup>As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. <sup>2</sup>For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you,

and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! <sup>3</sup>We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, <sup>4</sup>but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, <sup>5</sup>beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; <sup>6</sup>by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, <sup>7</sup>truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; <sup>8</sup>in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; <sup>9</sup>as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; <sup>10</sup>as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

### **GOSPEL: MATTHEW 6:1-6, 16-21**

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus commends almsgiving, prayer, and fasting, but emphasizes that spiritual devotion must not be done for show.

**P**: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the sixth chapter.

### C: Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus said to the disciples:<sup>1</sup>"Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

<sup>2</sup>"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their

reward. <sup>3</sup>But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, <sup>4</sup>so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

<sup>5</sup>"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. <sup>6</sup>But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

<sup>16</sup>"And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. <sup>17</sup>But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, <sup>18</sup>so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

<sup>19</sup>"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; <sup>20</sup>but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. <sup>21</sup>For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

# **INVITATION TO THE LENTEN DISCIPLINE**

Image Priends in Christ, Lent is a time to renew our life in the paschal mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection, in which we participate through the sacramental life of the church.

We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance and for the mercy and forgiveness proclaimed in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We show our resolve to amend our lives with the sign of ashes, which speak of our mortality and symbolize our repentance. I invite you, therefore, to observe a holy Lent, committing yourselves to self-examination and penitence, prayer and fasting, almsgiving and works of love; and to attend to the word of God and receive the sacraments of Christ as we journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

#### **CONFESSION OF SIN**

**P**: Let us kneel before God, our Creator and Redeemer, and confess our sin.

#### Kneel

- P Most holy and merciful God,
- C we confess to you and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed.
- We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

### C Have mercy on us, O God.

- ♥ We have not listened to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- We confess to you, O God, all our past unfaithfulness, the pride, envy, hypocrisy, and apathy that have infected our lives.
- **C** Have mercy on us, O God.

- P We confess to you our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people.
- **C** Have mercy on us, O God.
- P We confess to you our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us.
- **C** Have mercy on us, O God.
- P We confess to you our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty.
- **C** Have mercy on us, O God.
- We confess to you our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P We confess to you our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us.
- **C** Have mercy on us, O God.
- **P** Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.
- **C** Favorably hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

# **IMPOSITION OF ASHES**

- P: Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth. Bless these ashes and those who receive them. May this sign of our mortality and penitence remind us that only by the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ are we given eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Savior.
- C: Amen

Those who desire to receive ashes come forward by the center aisle and return by the side aisles. The pastor applies ashes to the forehead of each person with the words:

After all who desire ashes have received them, the pastor leads the congregation in the conclusion of the confession.

#### Kneel

- Accomplish in us, 0 God, the work of your salvation,
- **C** that we may show forth your glory in the world.
- **P** By the cross and Passion of your Son, our Lord,
- **C** bring us with all your saints to the joy of Christ's resurrection.
- Almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen us in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep us in eternal life.
- **C** Amen

#### Stand PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

A brief silence is held after the introduction.

**P**: Trusting in God's promise to reconcile all things, let us pray for the church, the well-being of creation, and a world in need.

After each petition:

P: Hear us, 0 God.

### C: Your mercy is great.



He is your Word, sent from heaven to a virgin's womb. He there took on our nature and our lot and was shown forth as your Son, born of the Holy Spirit and of the virgin Mary. Send your Spirit upon these gifts of your church; gather into one all who share this bread and wine; fill us with your Holy Spirit to establish our faith in truth, that we may praise and glorify you through your Son Jesus Christ; through whom all glory and honor are yours, almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy church, both now and forever.





#### A Celebration of Mortality

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." These words will be spoken in congregations and communities around the world today as Christians gather to remember our collective mortality with a smudge of ashes on our foreheads. Facing the reality of death can feel grim, and to go as far as to celebrate our mortality can feel countercultural in every way. Yet, perhaps it is in remembering our mortality, our frailty, and our limits that we find true freedom.

On Ash Wednesday, we are set free from our striving to be God. We are set free from the expectation that we are somehow superhuman. We can lay down the false hope that achievement, fame, wealth, popularity, or being "good enough" can save us from our inevitable end. We are freed from our endless attempts to convince ourselves or others that we are right or perfect or holy or that we have it all together. Instead, we get to exhale as we remember that we are nothing but human. We are creatures of the dust, and despite our striving, our convincing, our appearance-making, despite every attempt at maximizing our time or our money or climbing whatever ladder we are trying to climb... we are dust, and to dust we shall return.

Ash Wednesday invites us to take our rightful place with the rest of creation. After all, God is God, and we are not. And yet, God sees our dusty human selves and calls us "good" (Genesis 1:27, 31). Christ enters into our very human, very mortal lives and makes us holy, giving us the gift of abundant and eternal life. We have already been made new. We have already been declared good. We have all we need, and now we are freed to simply live.

But first, we remember the dust. And we remember the One who formed us from the dust and who will meet us when we return to dust at the end.

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
